

Mayor Proclamation

NOVEMBER PROCLAIMED AS DIABETES AWARENESS MONTH

At the November 3rd City Council Meeting, Nolanville Mayor Andy Williams signed a proclamation joining recognizing November 2022 as Diabetes Awareness Month and, by doing so, extended their most profound respect for those who are battling this disease that nearly half of the U.S. population has.

The proclamation reminds residents of Nolanville that diabetes affects 29.1 million people and is the seventh leading cause of death in the United States. This disease leads to damage of the heart, eyes, kidneys and limbs if untreated. Furthermore, another 86 million Americans have pre-diabetes.

"Awareness is key and taking action is crucial," said Nolanville Mayor Andy Williams. "We all know someone we love who suffers from either type I or type 2 diabetes, this disease has many faces."

With the end of the upcoming holidays being the biggest time of the year to indulge on foods, the American Diabetes Association offers food and recipe options that help those who struggle with insulin production.

For November, the lights at the Main Street underpass were switched to blue in honor of those who fight this disease and those who work tirelessly to provide support and cures for it.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, diabetes affects 29.1 million people -- 9.3% of the population in the United States, and is a serious disease for which there is no known cure and which is the seventh leading cause of death by disease in the United States; and

WHEREAS, approximately one quarter of the Americans who have diabetes, 8.1 million (27.8%) of people, do not know they have the disease and may experience damage to the heart, eyes, kidneys, and limbs without producing any symptoms; and


WHEREAS, another 86 million, or 1 in 3 American adults, has pre-diabetes, a condition which puts them at greater risk for developing Type 2 diabetes, and if current trends continue, 1 in 3 American adults will have diabetes by 2050; and

WHEREAS, Type I diabetes (TID) is an autoimmune disease in which a person's pancreas stops producing insulin, a hormone that enables people to get energy from food. It occurs when the body's immune system attacks and destroys the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas, called beta cells. While its causes are not yet entirely understood, scientists believe that both genetic factors and environmental triggers are involved. Its onset has nothing to do with diet or lifestyle. There is no prevention for TID, and – at present – no cure; TID strikes both children and adults at any age. It comes on suddenty, causes dependence on injected or pumped insulin for life, and carries the constant threat of devastating complications; and

WHEREAS, diabetes has many faces, affecting everyone, young and old alike - Caucasians, African Americans, Latinos, Native Americans, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, with minority populations in the United States having an increased risk for developing the disease; and

WHEREAS, an increase in community awareness of risk factors and symptoms related to diabetes can improve the likelihood that people with diabetes will get the attention they need before suffering the devastating complications of the disease;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Andy Williams, do hereby proclaim November, 2022, as DIABBTES AWARENESS MONTH in the City of Nolanville, and encourage all citizens to help fight this disease and its deadly complications, including heart and kidney disease, stroke, blindness, and amputation, by increasing awareness of the risk factors for diabetes, and by providing support to those suffering from diabetes.


City Council Changes Continuned

The City of Nolanville Brings Home Grant for Their Nolan Creek Matters Project



The City of Nolanville has been awarded the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) Clean Water Act 319 (h) grant. It will help to provide funding to support the City's "Nolan Creek Matters" program. The grant total is \$581, 221.55 which is broken down into \$346,423.00 federal and a \$234, 798.55 match.

Program goals are to help promote the health and well-being of Nolan Creek by adding a watershed coordinator.

The watershed coordinator's role in the community will reach beyond the limits of the City of Nolanville to assist in the execution of a Watershed Action Plan (WAP) and ensure the continued cooperation and needed measures to improve water quality conditions at South Nolan Creek.

The coordinator hired with the help of this grant will be instrumental in preparing programming and educational activities for visitors to the City of Nolanville's upcoming SMART Museum. Programming at the SMART Museum will bring attention to how different actions and activities can impact the various environments at the creek and will also provide citizen scientists the opportunity to participate in water labs where sampling and other research can be done.

This grant will also help to fund enhancements on the 10th street channel, such as removing culverts and replacing them with baffles, and adding a bioswale. These improvements will go a long way towards improving the treatment of stormwater runoff and will add visual appeal and long-term sustainability.

Finally, the grant will help Nolanville enhance its promotion of Nolan Creek and the opportunities for recreation the City hopes to provide soon.

The TCEQ Nonpoint Source (NPS) Program plans and implements activities that prevent or reduce urban and non-agricultural nonpoint source pollution in Texas waters. The grants are made available through a federal program authorized under Section 319 (h) of the CWA.

Winter Events Wrap Up

December is always such a magical and fun-filled time in the City of Nolanville, and this year was no exception. Let's look back at the sites and events that made this past holiday season magical.

Grinch Fest and Night Market

A live band, 25 vendors, three food trucks, a petting zoo, and 600 community members came together for yet another Grinch Fest! The guest of honor, the Grinch, was brought in personally by the Central Bell Fire and Rescue Department after locating the Grinch interfering with the lights on the main street. Volunteers from area high schools and City staff joined to make the event as fun as possible, providing free hot chocolate and smores for all to enjoy.

Light it Up: First Responder Parade

This year, the Nolanville Police Department's annual First Responder Parade lit up the night sky for a fun tribute fit for all. The parade will took place on Saturday, December 10, and featured all local first responders, military personnel, local organizations, equestrian clubs, and car groups.

The parade route lined Avenue H to 10th Street, ending at the Richard E Cavaso Elementary school. Holiday music and commentary were featured for those in attendance at the community center and attending live on Facebook.
