

Mayor Proclamation

OCTOBER PROCLAIMED AS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

At the October 6th City Council Meeting, Nolanville Mayor Andy Williams signed a proclamation joining the country in recognizing October 2022 as Breast Cancer Awareness Month and, by doing so, extends their most profound respect for survivors and those advocating for the prevention of and a cure for breast cancer.

The proclamation reminds residents of Nolanville that in Texas, 1 in 7 women are affected by breast cancer, while the national average is 1 in 8 women. Women are not alone in this fight, as breast cancer also affects men. New breast cancer diagnoses occur over two times more frequently than diagnoses of the second leading cancer, and breast cancer is the second most likely cause of death for women in the United States.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month is an annual campaign to raise awareness using pink ribbon imagery and lights, which aims to offer support for those courageously battling this disease; to recognize the many survivors, their supporters, and loved ones; and to honor those lives lost to this disease. "Awareness is key, but taking action is crucial," said Nolanville Mayor Andy Williams. "We know early detection can save lives, and we encourage regular screenings and self-exams."

For October, the lights at the Main Street underpass were switched to pink in honor of those who have fought and continue to fight.

WHEREAS; the COVID-19 pandemic impacted progress made in cancer treatment by creating a dramatic drop in mammograms in spring 2020, which led to later stage diagnoses, more aggressive treatments, and ultimately more, breast cancer related deaths; and

WHEREAS; researchers, scientists, and numerous nonprofit organizations, are dedicated to discover the cure for breast cancer. During the month of October, we acknowledge the extraordinary commitment and effort invested in this cause; and

WHEREAS; we recognize that over two and half million Americans are breast cancer rvivors that give us hope of a better future; and

WHEREAS; the City of Nolanville knows that Breast Cancer Awareness Month is an opportunity to unite the community and spread the important message of early detection, screening and prevention to women and men in order to prevent additional diagnoses, or even breast cancer deaths;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED that the City of Nolanville hereby extends our deepest respect for survivors and those advocating for prevention of and a cure for breast cancer and in so doing herby proclaim October 2022 as

2022 Fall Sweep & Bulk Drop Off Event



It's about that time! Mark your calendars and start rounding up that junk because Nolanville's big fall sweep is around the corner.

Each year, Nolanville residents take advantage of the Fall Sweep/Bulk Drop Off weekend, which is typically held the first weekend of November. This year, Nolanville Public Works (NPW), which organizes the event, is making some adjustments to make the process more convenient for community members by having two drop-off spots.

Like in previous years, the first drop-off spot will be located at Nolanville City Hall, 101 N 5th Street, from 8 AM to 2 PM. Here, residents can drive up, and NPW staff will be ready to unload your items in the dumpsters.

The second drop-off spot will be located off Mesquite and Ash for residents in the Woodlands subdivision to dispose of bulk items.

It is important to note that some items are not being accepted at this time.

- Tires
- Construction and remodeling debris
- Paint
- Household Hazardous waste such as fuel, oil, chemical cleaners
- Batteries
- Propane tanks
- Fridges and freezers ARE accepted but MUST have the freon REMOVED and tagged by a certified technician beforehand.

Brush is always accepted but please **<u>do not place them in the dumpsters</u>** for this event. Those can be brought to City Hall or scheduled for pick up.

No Nolanville resident should have to place bulk items on the curb for long periods of time. To dispose of items that won't fit in your trash bin, there are several year-round options for disposing of large items or brush, in addition to this year's Fall Sweep event. The following service is also available at no charge to each home once a year:

- 1 Free Curbside bulky pickup service a year is available to all Nolanville residents and is provided by Texas Disposal Systems. Residents can schedule a curbside appointment by contacting the City here
- Free brush pickup service is available for bundled tree limbs, leaves, branches, or other brush. These pickups are available year-round and can be scheduled by calling City Hall at 254-698-6335.





Election Brings Changes To City Council

Nolanville – The City of Nolanville has been awarded the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) Clean Water Act 319 (h) grant. It will help to provide funding to support the City's "Nolan Creek Matters" program. The grant total is \$581, 221.55 which is broken down into \$346,423.00 federal and a \$234, 798.55 match.

Program goals are to help promote the health and well-being of Nolan Creek by adding a watershed coordinator. The watershed coordinator's role in the community will reach beyond the limits of the City of Nolanville to assist in the execution of a Watershed Action Plan (WAP) and ensure the continued cooperation and needed measures to improve water quality conditions at South Nolan Creek.

The coordinator hired with the help of this grant will be instrumental in preparing programming and educational activities for visitors to the City of Nolanville's upcoming SMART Museum. Programming at the SMART Museum will bring attention to how different actions and activities can impact the various environments at the creek and will also provide citizen scientists the opportunity to participate in water labs where sampling and other research can be done.

This grant will also help to fund enhancements on the 10th street channel, such as removing culverts and replacing them with baffles and adding a bioswale. These improvements will go a long way towards improving the treatment of stormwater runoff and will add visual appeal and long-term sustainability.




Halloween Pumpkins With The Boys and Girls Club
